Help Us Meet Our Goal of \$3,000 Each Month

It's been just over a year since the first load of Sheldon horses arrived in Corning, CA, and what a year it has been! There have been many ups and downs this year, and I am happy to report that we have moved the horses to various locations in Northern California in order to dramatically reduce our costs. This will give us a chance to regroup while we look for a permanent location where all the horses can be brought together again.

Currently all of the geldings and studs have been moved to 800 acres in NE California, not too far from their original home range. Most of the mares (10) along with our two foals, are located in Orland, CA where they are enjoying 20 acres of irrigated pasture. The remaining 5 mares are now located in Corning, CA on 10 acres of pasture. This has reduced our total monthly costs by almost \$3,000!!!



Our current cost breakdown is as follows:

\$400 - Board on 800 acres NE California


\$1,950 – feed for horses in NE, CA (approximate – depends on hay prices)

\$300 – irrigated pasture for mares/foals in Orland (some hay may be needed in the winter)

\$350 - board and feed in Corning

Total costs: approximately \$3,000 per month. We have started a pledge drive to get enough monthly donors to cover our basic monthly expenses. Currently we have \$510.00 in monthly donations, and hope to reach our goal of \$3,000 monthly donations by the end of the year.

The Mustang Project is currently caring for the last remaining horses removed from the **Sheldon National Wildlife Refuge** by US Fish & Wildlife. Many of the horses we have are 20 years or older, and have survived their entire lives in the wild, only to be rounded up and have their family bands split apart. We took these horses with the goal of having them



live out their lives in as natural state as possible, with as many of their herd as possible. These herds roamed the land long before it was declared a wildlife refuge. The horses from this area were often rounded up and used by the government as cavalry mounts, and fought in wars as recent as WWI. USF&WS as well as the US Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management are removing horses from the wild at an alarming rate, and now have plans to sterilize the horses that remain in the wild. Soon the **herds of wild horses will no longer exist** on the public lands *that were specifically set aside for the horses by Congress*.

The Mustang Project welcomed two foals this spring. Pictured here is the first foal, a colt, who was named "Sheldon" in honor of the Sheldon National Wildlife Refuge where his herd originated. The Mustang Project's Mission:

- 1. to provide a program for youth, especially those deemed to be at-risk, to learn about, interact with, and care for horses,

- 4. to foster a sense of accomplishment and self-worth among participants, and to provide an incentive for them to excel in all areas of their lives,
- 5. to give participants the skills and opportunities to pursue a career working with horses if desired,
- 6. to hold special events and distribute educational materials to increase public awareness about adopting and training Mustangs,
- 7. to adopt Mustangs for use in the program, especially those mustangs in danger of going to slaughter,
- 8. to directly engage in, and provide facilities for the promotion of these objectives.
